ABOUT OURAY

SWITZERLAND OF AMERICA





The historic City of Ouray was originally established in the 1870s by miners chasing silver and gold in the surrounding mountains and at one point the town once boasted more horses and mules than people. At the height of the mining boom, Ouray had more than 30 active mines. By 1877, Ouray had grown to over 1,000 in population and was named county seat of the newly formed Ouray County. The town is named after Chief Ouray of the Ute Indians, a Native American tribe.

Ouray is surrounded on three sides by 13,000 foot peaks. This magnificent setting, along with the wide variety of activities for locals and visitors give the town its nickname: "The Switzerland of America". In addition to the some of the best off road trails in Colorado, Ouray has much to offer during your visit. One thing you don't want to miss is the therapeutic Hot Springs Pool, located toward the north end of town right on US-550. The amazing Box Canyon Falls are a true natural wonder, and Cascade Falls (you can see them from anywhere in town) are even more impressive up close.

The entire town is registered as a National Historic District with most of the buildings dating back to the late nineteenth century. The Beaumont Hotel, Ouray City Hall, Ouray County Courthouse, St. Elmo Hotel, St. Joseph's Miners' Hospital (currently housing the Ouray County Historical Society and Museum), Western Hotel, and Wright's Opera House are all on the National Register of Historic Places.



Throughout this guide you'll find trail maps inspired by Hema Maps, and produced by Shane Williams.



FAMILY ACTIVITIES

Ouray and the surrounding area are a great place for families to enjoy the mountains. There are numerous activities that will be fun for the entire family.

OURAY

The world famous hot springs pools in Ouray are open 10AM to 10PM every day during the summer. For little ones, the slides and Wibits open at noon. This public pool is an inexpensive way to spend a few hours, but make sure everyone has plenty of sunscreen on.

While shopping options abound for adults, the best little shop for kids young and old is the Wheels, Wings, and Nautical Things store (801 Main St). Inside you'll find everything from cool car toys, airplane toys and memorabilia, and plenty of other cool items.

SILVERTON

If you want to spend a little more time in Silverton learning about this history of this area, the Old Hundred Gold Mine Tour is a great option. Located on CR-4a just off the Road to Animas Forks (CR-2). Tours start every hour from 10am-4pm, and run \$18.95 per adult, \$16.95 for seniors (60+), \$9.95 for kids 5-12, and kids 4 & under (if held on lap) are free.

TELLURIDE

The Gondola from downtown Telluride up to Mountain Village is always free, and operates most of the year. It's an amazing view on the 13 minute ride and you'll gain 1,750 in elevation along the way. Once at the top you can visit shops and restaurants in Mountain Village, or get back on for a fun ride down.

TRAIL RATINGS

The trail ratings in this guide use the 1-10 scale developed by the Colorado 4 Wheel Drive Association (www.hightrails.org). The most difficult trail in this guide is rated a Moderate (5).



EASY (1)Easy Graded dirt road. Dry, or less than 3"

Easy Graded dirt road. Dry, or less than 3" water crossing depth. Gentle grades. 2WD under all conditions except snow. No width

problems, two vehicles wide.

EASY (2)Dirt road. Dry, or less than 3" water crossing depth.

Dirt road. Dry, or less than 3" water crossing depth. Some ruts. Slight grades, up to 10 degrees. 2WD under most conditions. Rain or snow may make 4WD necessary. Usually one and a half to two vehicles wide.

EASY (3)

Dirt road. Rutted, washes, or gulches. Water crossings up to 6" depth. Passable mud. Grades up to 10 degrees. Small rocks or holes. 4WD recommended but 2WD possible under good conditions and with adequate ground clearance and skill. No width problems for

any normal vehicle. Vehicle passing spots frequently available if less than two vehicles wide.

EASY (4)

Rutted and/or rocky road. No shelves but rocks to 9". Water crossings usually less than hub deep. Passable mud. Grades moderate, up to 15 degrees. Side hill moderate up to 15 degrees. 4WD under most conditions. No width problems, vehicle passing spots frequently available if less than two vehicles wide.



MODERATE (5) Rutted and/or rocky road. No shelves. Rocks

Rutted and/or rocky road. No shelves. Rocks up to 12" and water crossings up to 12" with possible currents. Passable mud. Moderate grades to 15 degrees. 6" holes. Side hill to 20 degrees.

4WD required. No width problems.

NOTE: The rating of a trail can and will change based on a variety of factors such as weather, snow/mud, and time of year. Please evaluate each trail and obstacle before attempting anything you're not comfortable with.

A SNOWY YEAR

The last year has been one of the 'snowiest' in recorded history for Colorado, especially in the southwestern part of the state. This is great for reservoirs, moisture for the land, and to help minimize the risk of fires. However it also creates potential problems for backcountry exploration.

Rivers & Flooding

The rivers all across the state are flowing at very high levels. This can result in flooding depending on the area and time of day. River crossings can be very dangerous, so it's important to follow the instructions of your trail leader. If there's a question of safety, avoid the crossing.



Trail Conditions

Everything from avalanche debris, to downed trees, and extra wet and muddy trail conditions can be expected. Trails that are historically dry and rocky may be muddy, wet, and slick. This means that some trails will be closed and others may be more difficult and dangerous than expected.

The safety of each Summiteer will always come first, so please make sure you know the risks while you're out exploring the high country. Remember that Ouray has plenty of great things to do around town as well. =)

IMOGENE PASS

This trail is one of the most scenic in the region and a true joy to run at the FJ Summit. Imogene Pass sits at 13,114 ft., and is the second highest pass in Colorado passable by vehicles. It connects Ouray with Telluride and is also the highest mountain pass in the San Juan Mountains. From Ouray, the road turns off the road to Yankee Boy Basin above the Camp Bird Mine, near the ghost town of Sneffels southwest of Ouray. Just after this turn is a great (optional) water crossing that most FJ's have a great time with. From there, the trail ascends Imogene Basin to the summit.

As you climb above Camp Bird Mine, look back towards Ouray for an amazing view! Many groups choose to stop near Upper Camp Bird, just after crossing Imogene Creek. Pressing on toward the summit, you'll experience several moderate obstacles to test your rig out. You may see large snow drifts as you gain elevation, so watch out for wet and slippery surfaces.


The first long distance alternating current power line was constructed over Imogene Pass to carry power from

THIS IS COLORADO!


The Alpine Loop Scenic Byway is the longest route in the San Juan Region, totaling over 65 miles from start to finish and features some of North America's most magnificent scenery. The views from Engineer and Cinnamon Passes are nothing short of amazing, and really define what off roading in this area of Colorado is all about. Some say that you can see forever on a clear day from the top of Engineer Pass.

The route first takes you to an elevation of over 13,000 feet and the summit of Engineer Pass. The rough road to the top of the pass (Mineral Creek) is the most difficult section of the trail and earns the Moderate rating. You'll want to take many photo breaks throughout the trip, so have your camera ready! After a quick pit-stop in Lake City, you'll continue on the south leg over Cinnamon Pass. While it isn't as high as Engineer, the views are just as stunning. Take extra caution on the road up to

Cinnamon, since it's a dirt road you'll probably see many passenger cars on this leg.

When you have time to explore more before or after your FJ Summit adventure, be sure to spend time on some of the other trails in the area. Wager Gulch takes you all the way to the Continental Divide and the Carson Ghost Town site, while Picayune/Placer Gulches provide a good route around the crowded Animas Forks Ghost Town.

This area was inhabited by Native Americans for centuries before miners came looking for gold, silver, zinc, and lead in the late 1800s. The trails that make up the Alpine Loop (and the many side trips) were first used by these miners. If you choose to stop at any of the abandoned mines, please enjoy the history from a safe distance. The structures are not maintained and are in a constant state of decay. They are very unstable and could collapse at any time.

GHOST TOWNS


ANIMAS FORKS GHOST TOWN

The San Juan Mountains are home to countless wonders, both natural and man made. As you travel the high mountain passes and scenic trails in the area, you'll come across ruins of mines and ghost towns in various states of decay.

Perhaps the most interesting and well preserved of these is Animas Forks, which you will have the opportunity to see during several organized runs.

Some of the structures in Animas Forks date back as early as 1873, so keep that in mind while exploring. Animas Forks flourished with up to 30 buildings, and its own newspaper until the early 1900s when mining in the area declined. By the 1920s, the town was abandoned and looked much like it does today.

In the late 90s the Colorado State Historical Fund, San Juan County, and BLM, partnered to stabilize the structures you see today. Feel free to explore, but keep in mind these buildings are very old and may not always be 100% stable.

DRONE ZONES

NOTES ABOUT DRONE USAGE:

One of the most amazing technology items that has become popular in the last few years are small unmanned aircraft, commonly known as drones. We all really enjoy the amazing photos and videos these devices can produce, but ask that you follow these simple rules:

- » We ask that you avoid flying drones in/around FJ Summit HQ due to the likelihood of flying directly over people, which would violate FAA rules.
- » Before you fly over any trail group, coordinate with the trail leader to ensure all participants are aware of drone usage.
- » The pilot is responsible for knowing all FAA rules regarding drone flights and usage of photos/ videos produced.
- » Contact local authorities, Bureau of Land Management, and the US Forest Service for any situations that may affect flying your drone.

BLACK BEAR PASS


Black Bear Pass is one of the most thrilling trails in the San Juan Mountains. It starts from the 11,018 ft. summit of Red Mountain Pass south of Ouray, and ends in Telluride. From the 12,840 ft. summit, the trail narrows and descends over a set of infamous switchbacks as it navigates the heights above Telluride. It passes Bridal Veil Falls, which is the highest waterfall in Colorado. The trail was made famous in a song by C.W. McCall of the same name.


Black Bear Pass is only open a few months out of the year, although it should be open for the FJ Summit. The downhill portion of the trail is one way only: downhill east to west.

This trail is rated by some as a difficult, but the obstacles result in a moderate rating. It IS however, a



dangerous trail and not for the faint of heart. Extreme caution must be taken, especially for new off road drivers. Take your time and listen to more experienced drivers. Above all, stay safe and enjoy the view!











The only true difficult trail in the area that's


part of the FJ Summit is Poughkeepsie Gulch, and "The Wall" is the only obstacle that will give you much trouble.

that will give you much trouble. Use extreme caution on this part of the trail and pay attention to your spotter. Follow the 'Three Attempt' rule and accept a winch if you don't make it on the third try.

California and Corkscrew Gulches

will provide you with truly amazing views of the Red Mountains. Although these trails are steep and can be narrow, there are no obstacles to contend with so enjoy the views while you use your engine to brake your truck down the steep inclines.




GULCHES

The 'South Gulches' of Maggie, Minnie, and Arrastra will provide a little more challenge than other trails while still offering amazing mountain views, and of course mine ruins.

Also be sure to look out for the waterfalls and abandoned trams as you explore these great trails! The top of Maggie Gulch will bring you within a few hundred feet of the Continenatl Divide.

Arrastra Gulch is a really entertaining trail full of history, ruins, and of course tram towers. The mines were established as early as the 1870's and the tramway was built in the 1920's.

STONY PASS & KITE LAKE

THE CONTINENTAL DIVIDE AND EPIC VIEWS



One of the longer trails you can run at the FJ Summit that pays off at a really great high alpine lake. The route from Silverton over Stony Pass shows off multiple mining site ruins and well preserved Buffalo Boy Tram House before crossing the Continental Divide at 12,592ft. A few miles down the eastern side of the pass, you'll turn South to head toward Kite Lake. A gorgeous mountain lake just a few hundred feet below the Divide awaits you at the end of the trail.

Both trails are rated moderate due to their steep and rocky terrain. Mud can also be an issue depending on the year, so make sure you take your time.





MILLION DOLLAR HIGHWAY

The Million Dollar Highway is the section of U.S. Route 550 that runs from Durango to Ouray, CO. The 12 miles south of Ouray through the Uncompandere Gorge to the summit of Red Mountain Pass give the highway its name. This stretch features steep cliffs and no guardrails (don't look down!), and the ascent of Red Mountain Pass has a number of hairpin "S" curves. Traveling north from Silverton to Ouray allows you to hug the inside of curves, however heading south from Ouray to Silverton perches you on the outside edge of the highway.

The origin of the name "Million Dollar Highway" is disputed. There are several legends of its origin including: "it cost a million dollars a mile" to build and "it contains a million dollars in gold ore in the fill dirt." We prefer to say this stretch of highway features million dollar views.

The original Highway was a toll road built by Otto Mears in 1883 to connect Ouray and Ironton. In the late 1880s, Otto Mears turned to building railroads and built the Silverton Railroad north from Silverton over Red Mountain Pass to reach the lucrative mining districts around Red Mountain, terminating at Albany just eight miles south of Ouray. In the early 1920s, the original toll road was rebuilt at considerable cost and became the



present day US 550. Today the entire route is part of the San Juan Skyway Scenic Byway.



TELLURIDE

Telluride is a former silver mining camp on the San Miguel River in the western San Juan Mountains and in recent history has become a major high-end resort destination. The Telluride Historic District, which includes a significant portion of the town, is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and is also one of Colorado's 20 National Historic Landmarks.

Telluride sits in a box canyon and steep forested mountains and cliffs surround it. Bridal Veil Falls is at




the head of the canyon and is clearly visible from Black Bear Pass trail. If you're spending a little extra time in Telluride, a free gondola connects to Mountain Village at the base of the ski area.

Telluride has served as the backdrop for several television commercials and is home to an international film festival held every September. Telluride was mentioned in "Smuggler's Blues" by Glenn Frey, and was the subject of an essay by Edward Abbey, and


eponymous songs by The Nitty Gritty Dirt Band, Kate Wolf, and Tim McGraw.

While most FJ Summit trail runs will leave Telluride via Ophir pass, other options for returning to Ouray are Imogene Pass and Last Dollar Road. Neither of those roads should be taken from the Telluride side as part of the FJ Summit, due to the dangers of too much two-way traffic on narrow trails. The quickest way back to Ouray from Telluride is via state highways 145 and 62 to Highway 550.

A FREE GONDOLA CONNECTS TO MOUNTAIN VILLAGE AT THE BASE OF THE SKI AREA.









SILVERTON

Silverton is the county seat and the only incorporated municipality in San Juan County. Silverton is a former silver mining camp, most of which is now included in a federally designated National Historic Landmark District, the Silverton Historic District. Just outside Silverton, along state highway 110, is Silverton Ski Area, an advanced-only ski area that's known for its extreme terrain.

Silverton is linked to Durango by the Durango and Silverton Narrow Gauge Railroad, a National Historic Landmark. Silverton no longer has active mining, but subsists by tourism, maintenance of US 550, mine pollution remediation, and retirees.

Silverton was the setting for some of Shaun White's 2010 Olympic training. Taking advantage of the secluded locale, terrain and snow fall, Red Bull built a private halfpipe for the snowboarder. Known as "Project X," the halfpipe was completed in February 2009 on the backside of Silverton Mountain and allowed the boarder to perfect some of his gold medal winning moves far from prying eyes.

While you're in Silverton after a trail run, take notice of the gracious residents. Some service stations offer free air-up compressors for you to use, so please think about helping support this great little mining town through your purchases at local stores.


LAKE CITY

Lake City (named after nearby Lake San Cristobal) is the only incorporated municipality in Hinsdale County, and also serves as the county seat. Lake City was founded as a supply center for miners and prospectors during the late 1800s, and at one point boomed to

a population of nearly 5,000 settlers. By 1910 the population had dropped to around 400 as the mining era was over, it wasn't until the 1930s that tourism took hold in the town as its major industry.

Today, the town continues to restore historical buildings and while the full time population hovers around 408, thousands of tourists trek to the mountain town every summer. The Lake City Historic District includes several buildings from the 1875-1881 area as well as a few late 1890s structures.

This town is a perfect stop for those enjoying the long Alpine Tour route. You'll descend to the town after summiting Engineer Pass, and will return to the Ouray area via the easy-rated Cinnamon Pass. Take a little time to enjoy this precious and well preserved mining town.























SAN JUAN MOUNTAINS

During this event, you'll be exploring the epic San Juan Mountains, the largest mountain range in Colorado by area, and most routes were originally established to connect miners to the mining towns you are visiting.

These steep mountains receive over 300 inches of snow every year, and many passes don't open until just before the FJ Summit begins. The runoff from this melting snow feeds the dozens of rivers and waterfalls, and helps ensure our time in this area is full of amazing views.

COMMUNICATIONS

There are three main types of communication that will be used a the FJ Summit: CB's (Primarily), FRS/GMRS radios, and Ham radios. When possible, a Ham operator with a CB will be within range of all trail run groups. Radio communications are not required for the event but do add to the experience by allowing you to communicate with the other FJs in your trail group.

CB RADIO

CB radio transmits at 4 watts and uses AM frequencies. CB is very common among 4x4 groups. CB AM frequencies usually are subject to greater noise interference than FM frequencies and have a shorter effective range. No license is required.

FRS & GMRS RADIO:

FRS radio transmits at 0.5 watts from small handheld devices, therefore has limited range. FRS is good for close-group communication. No license is required. GMRS radios are now available in vehicle mounted versions that transmit up to 15 watts in addition to traditional handheld radios. A no-test license is required to legally operate on GMRS frequencies and requires a \$90 fee and expires five years from date of purchase.

HAM RADIO:


Ham radio (aka Amateur Radio) transmits at 5-100 watts for handheld and mobile units and therefore has greater range. Ham radio uses FM frequencies for clear audio. It has the advantage of using devices that listen for and repeat a radio signal giving even greater range (repeaters).

You can also use Ham without repeaters, this is known as Simplex. A license is required to operate a Ham radio.

At the FJ Summit, most ham radio operators will have a FJ Cruiser Ham badge or sticker on their vehicle. Hams are always happy to chat about the hobby, so don't be afraid to ask questions.








STAY THE TRAIL

Since 2003, the Responsible Recreation Campaign, and its flagship, Stay The Trail Colorado (STT) Off Highway Vehicle (OHV) educational program, have been focused on encouraging responsible OHV recreation on the roads and trails that are open to motorized use on public lands within the State of Colorado.

Top Tips to help you enjoy the trails, and preserve them for others to enjoy in the future:

- **»** Go over obstacles, not around them. Rocks, puddles, whoops, and other obstacles keep the trail fun.
- » Don't take shortcuts or blaze new trails.
- » Slow down when approaching other trail users. If passing another group, keep count of how many vehicles behind you and let them know.
- **»** Some of the trails in this region can be intimidating, if you're nervous, ask for a spotter!

FJ SUMMIT RULES & REGULATIONS

REGISTRATION

- **»** Every person that enters into the event needs to be checked in and registered.
- » All adults and minors must sign a waiver and rules sheet.
- » All minors must have a waiver signed by their parent or legal guardian and must be accompanied by an adult.
- » Safety Rules & Regulations
- » Respect and listen to your trail leader.
- » Alcohol is expressly forbidden on all trails.
- » No glass containers are permitted on trails.
- » Observe the speed limit on all roads, trails, and private areas.
- » Observe all trail signs and rules.
- » No winching to: trees without a tree saver or strap, power poles, fences, or pipelines.
- » Stay on existing marked and designated vehicle trails—NO TRAIL BLAZING.
- » Downhill vehicles generally yield to uphill vehicles.
- **»** Groups on trails are limited to 10 vehicles. Don't bunch up.

- **»** Trails are often 2-way. Please respect oncoming traffic and locals.
- » All Hotel Property management rules apply.
- » Members and guests are encouraged to help enforce the rules in order to preserve the trails and environment and have a cleaner, safe place for everyone.
- » The hotel offers alcohol served on property.
- » Although state law may allow it, please consider not carrying side arms at this family event.
- » Rowdiness, excessive noise, excessive vehicle noise cannot be tolerated.
- » Please respect the locals, remember, you represent the FJ Summit and we are their guests.

FJ Summit reserves the right to remove a participant from FJ Summit activities and trail runs with no refund issued.

TIPS FOR HAVING A GREAT TIME

EASY WAYS TO ENSURE EVERYONE HAS A GREAT TIME:

If you choose to have a drink, please keep moderation in mind. We all want to have a good time and no one wants to babysit someone that's had too much. Keep in mind that a little alcohol can go a long way at high altitude. Also remember that most trail runs will have you off-road for most of the day, it won't be nearly as enjoyable with a massive hangover.

Please clean up after yourself. There will be plenty of garbage cans around FJ Summit Headquarters. Want to help out? Pick up any trash you see in town or on the trail, good impressions will last forever in a little town like Ouray.

Remember that we all spend a great amount of time on our trucks. Ask permission before poking around someone's rig.

ON THE TRAIL...

While we will have the best vehicles on the trail, we won't be alone. Many people travel to the San Juan

Mountains this time of year to enjoy the beauty. Other visitors such as hikers, photographers, etc. will be on the same trails as us, so remember trail etiquette:

- » Slow down when passing hikers, they certainly don't want to inhale any more of your dust than necessary.
- **»** Look for photographers in odd places such as stream beds or behind rocks.
- **»** Give a nice wave when passing someone (even if they're in a Jeep).
- » Don't follow too close on tight trails; give the truck in front of you plenty of room to maneuver. Also, try not to fall back on easier trails, keep up with the group.
- » Don't leave the group without telling the Trail Leader.
- » Keep the vehicle behind you in your rearview mirror. If you don't see it, stop and wait until you can see it.
